Summer is a time for service

This summer, many Ohio Conference congregations are involved in acts of service. Here are just a few examples of how congregations are serving others in their home communities and in other areas.

OAK GROVE (SMITHVILLE)

About 80 people from Oak Grove spent a Saturday morning in July hammering nails and constructing the out-

er walls of a house in the parking lot area of the church. The walls were later moved to the house's permanent site in Wooster. The Oak Grove

committed about \$60,000 toward completing the house for a local family as part of a Habitat for Humanity project. An article about the project was featured in the Wooster Daily Record.

NORTH CLINTON (WAUSEON)

Many volunteers from North Clinton helped with the Grandstand Diner during a Motorcycle Weekend in July. Volunteers cleaned the Diner before the weekend, set up, and served during the weekend at the Diner and in the church kitchen. This fundraiser had a net profit of \$12,000, which will be distributed between the church's Compassion Fund and mission agencies in the church giving plan.

BERLIN
