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Missional Conference focuses on evangelism and discipleship

Just prior to Annual Conference Assembly, the Ohio Conference held the Gathered and Sent Missional Conference at Bluffton University March 8-9. One hundred eight people from across the Conference participated in this event.

During four sessions, speakers Meghan Good and Marvin Lorenzana challenged common assumptions about evangelism and discipleship. Meghan Good, the teaching pastor at Trinity Mennonite Church in Glendale, Arizona, focused on evangelism, and Marvin Lorenzana, the discipleship initiatives director for Mennonite Mission Network, focused on discipleship.

Meghan Good asked participants to consider questions such as, "How is this [activity of our church] helping us fulfill our mission as ambassadors of reconciliation to God? How is it getting in the way!"

Marvin Lorenzana said, "Discipleship is all about

training (disciplining) our spiritual ears to hear God's voice." He defined missional discipleship as the type of discipleship that multiplies (i.e., disciples who make disciples who make disciples).

In addition to presentations by the speakers, the conference included panel discussions, question-and-answer sessions with the speakers, and a chance for everyone attending to participate in a simulation of a missional discipleship group. These groups, which meet for

about an hour weekly, usually include three people and focus on accountability, scripture and prayer. The groups had five key questions to guide their discussions.

Each missional conference participant received a copy of the book Reunion: The Good News of Jesus for Seekers, Saints, and Sinners by Bruxy Cavey and a copy of Growing the Church in the Rural Neighborhood by Brad Roth, a booklet in Mennonite Mission Network's Missio Dei series.

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CONFERENCE MINISTER ANNOUNCEMENT

Conference Moderator Bob Sauder made a statement about the search for a conference minister. (A copy of the statement is on page 4.) The Leadership Team has concluded that hiring a conference minister at a half-time capacity is not a healthy thing for any candidate or the Conference at this time, considering the scope of the position's duties.

Bob Sauder also announced that Regional Pastor Ralph Reinford, who has been taking on many of the conference minister duties since the departure of Transitional Conference Leader George O'Reilly, will take three months for respite beginning in May, and then will return to Conference work after that time. He will transition to a half-time position as regional pastor on Nov. I or when a new conference minister is in place.

At a later business session, delegates passed a resolution of appreciation for the work of Regional Pastors Ralph Reinford and Cliff Brubaker. (See the text of the resolution below.)



SPENDING PLAN APPROVED

Delegates approved a spending plan for the 2018-19 fiscal year. The plan calls for spending totaling \$380,150. While introducing the spending plans to delegates, Stewardship Ministry Co-Chair Melanie Miller noted that giving to the Conference during 2017-18 has exceeded projections. RELEASE OF CONGREGATIONS

Delegates approved a motion to release two congregations which have chosen to leave the Ohio Conference during 2017-18, Leetonia Mennonite Church and Lima Mennonite Church. Leetonia Mennonite Church voted on Nov. 30 to leave the Ohio Conference and Mennonite Church USA. The congregation has joined the Evana Network.

Lima Mennonite Church had been a dual-conference congre-

Leadership Team decides against hiring half-time conference leader

Full-time conference minister sought

After many hours spent discussing the conference minister position and a very comprehensive search process, the Search Committee and the Leadership Team are in agreement that hiring someone at a half-time capacity is not a healthy thing for any candidate or the Conference at this time.

We apologize to the Conference staff and to those of you who have counseled us from the beginning that half-time was not a good idea. The plus side is that this discussion has helped us to focus on what it is we really expect from this position and where we as a Conference hope to direct our efforts.

I feel we did a good job of defining the duties of what the conference minister has done in the past. And we did a fair job of prioritizing those functions that were most important and things that could be left undone if and when time became a factor. At the same time, we added responsibilities that we felt were important in moving the Conference in the direction of becoming more mission-oriented.

I will say that I pushed the hardest to keep moving forward with the half-time position. My goal was to alleviate the extra burden and stress that we had put on the staff. In retrospect, I did not realize that in making this a half-time position, we would in effect be expecting the present staff to pick up the pieces that were not covered, increasing their workload and stress rather than decreasing it.

I apologize for that miscalculation. My sincerest hope was that I would be introducing a new conference minister at these meetings [Annual Conference Assembly] and that we could spend the next two years continuing to watch the Conference become a vital instrument in God's Kingdom work.

So, where do we go from here? Ralph Reinford has faithfully picked up many of the duties of the conference minister along with his full-time regional pastor's role for the past two years. But in the process, he has been stretched in unhealthy ways. In January, the Leadership Team offered Ralph a threemonth leave with no strings attached. Ralph returned a counter-proposal to the Leadership Team in February. His proposal was to take the months of May-July for respite and regrouping. On his return he will continue his present duties until a conference minister is hired or until Nov. I, when he will reduce his time to .5 FTE and resume only his regional pastor responsibilities.

Leadership Team has committed to working with Ralph and Cliff Brubaker to determine ways in which we can keep their workload at that level.

Leadership Team has accepted this very gracious offer. We have asked the search group to reopen the search for a full-time conference minister with skills as a transformational leader who will equip us for navigating the opportunities and challenges for the church today. Interest in Anabaptism is rising, and Ohio Conference wants a conference minister to help us extend our witness.

The Leadership Team is committed to continuing to look for ways we can adjust staff responsibilities and workloads that will allow us to create what we believe will be an effective and sustainable job description for the conference minister. At the same time, we will do our best to continue to offer our congregations the support they need and maintain the energy and momentum that the Gathered and Sent initiatives have brought to the Conference.

Thank you for your prayers and counsel, and we ask you to continue to support us in the coming months as we move forward in the process of finding a conference minister.

Conference Moderator Bob Sauder shared this statement with delegates at the 2018 Annual Conference Asssembly. ■

gation with membership in both Central District Conference and the Ohio Conference. After a time of processing the decision, the congregation decided to affiliate solely with the Central District Conference, Lima Mennonite's pastor, Emily Hedrick, read a statement from the congregation and expressed her appreciation for the positive experiences she has had with the Ohio Conference. Regional Pastor Cliff Brubaker led the delegates in a prayer for Leetonia Mennonite and Lima Mennonite.

MISSIONAL CON-SULTANT REPORTS

Jessica Schrock-Ringenberg, who is serving Ohio Conference as a missional consultant on a part-time volunteer basis, reported on her work with the Conference. She described herself as a "disturber and equipper" at Zion Mennonite Church, and told delegates that a missional movement has to come from the grassroots up. She brought a map of Ohio to the meetings and invited delegates to plot their church on the map to indicate their desire

to participate in the missional network in Ohio Conference, as well as giving their contact information. She asked delegates to consider the question, "What are you being called to do?"

MISSIONAL STORIES SHARED

Delegates also heard stories about how God is at work in the Conference. Jared Chase shared the story of Sharon Mennonite Church's summer work camp. Larry and Ginny Cress talked about the Wheelhouse, a ministry in Lima which helps provide bicycles for people who need transportation. Jessica Schrock-Ringenberg told delegates about Zion Mennonite Church's development of a collaborative ministry team. In addition to business, dele-



gates also spent time in worship. Speakers for the worship services were Meghan Good and Marvin Lorenzana, who were the presenters for the Gathered and Sent Missional Conference which preceded ACA. At the Friday evening worship service, which had the theme, "The Church Needs to be Evangelistic to be the Church," Meghan Good spoke about "The One That Got Away," focusing on Jesus' announcement of his ministry in Luke 4 and on the Parable of the Lost Sheep. On Saturday morning, Marvin Lorenzana spoke about discipleship in his message, "Igniting a Culture of Multiplication."

In other business, the delegates:

- Attended workshops on a variety of topics;
- Approved the minutes of the 2017 ACA;
- Attended a plenary session featuring speakers Meghan Good and Marvin Lorenzana;
- Were introduced to pastors with new assignments in the Ohio Conference;
- Affirmed the personnel slate

AMBS

In their final year of study, Master of Arts in Christian Formation students at Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) complete a final project — a ministry program for spiritual formation to be implemented in a specific setting. Recently, AMBS asked four students to share about their projects and how AMBS has prepared them for ministry. Miriam Zehr's reflection on her project appears here. Miriam Zehr is associate pastor of worship and education at Oak Grove Mennonite Church in Smithville, Ohio, which is celebrating its 200th anniversary this year over three weekends — one focusing on history, one on music and one on homecoming/reunions. Her project is to plan three worship services: one was a kick-off for the year in January, and the other two will be for the historical focus weekend in April.

She describes her project as follows:

"Worship planning is one of the favorite parts of my job. I also have interest in doing more collaborative worship planning and wanted to experiment with this project. A group of four is working with me. Since we are celebrating our 200th anniversary, I thought this would be a natural fit.

"I hope that in reflecting on the past and the legacy that has been left for us, we can be grateful for the ways God has been faithful to this church community and for the ways Oak Grove has impacted people's lives within the family of faith, the local community and the wider church. I also hope the congregation will be challenged to consider what legacy we want to leave for future generations. For example, on Jan. 14 we invited worship participants to hang leaves on a 'legacy tree'; on one side they

were to write a spiritual legacy they had received, and on the other, a legacy they hoped to leave.

He served as pastor of First Mennonite Church in Canton, and also served as interim pastor for numerous Mennonite and Church of the Brethren congregations.

Melvin was born on Aug. 3, 1925, in Pompeii, Michigan, to the late Rueben and Emily (Teuscher) Leidig. He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Lois (Gisel); his daughter, Shari Leidig Holland (Scott) of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; sister Bernice of Harrisonburg, Virginia; and many nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his daughter, Debra Anne Leidig, in 2001, who was developmentally disabled; his parents Rueben and Emily; brothers, Clarence and Wilbur; and sisters, Hazel and Gladys.

Melvin was member of Orrville Mennonite Church. At the age of 13 he became a Christian and was greatly influenced by the death of his Uncle Dan, who died as a conscientious objector in World War I. As a result, Melvin became a conscientious objector when he was of age. He graduated from Ontario Mennonite Bible Institute and was ordained in the Indiana Michigan Mennonite Conference.

Melvin met his wife, Lois, while in Mennonite voluntary service in Saginaw, Michigan, where he started Grace Chapel Mennonite Church. He later attended Western Michigan University, where he received both a B.A. in social work and an M.A. in counseling.

Following his graduate work, he was called to First Mennonite Church in Canton, Ohio. There he helped start South East Community Organization (SECO) and was involved in many community organizing activities. He worked for a variety of social service organizations in Michigan and Ohio while pastoring. Mel had a pastoral heart and was gifted in helping congregations through transitions. He did many interim

pastorates throughout Stark
County and Wayne County,
Ohio, for both Mennonite and
Church of the Brethren congregations. He was an ordained
retired minister in the Ohio
Conference of Mennonite
Church USA.

He was deeply involved in civil rights, peace and justice leadership while always keeping current on world events up to the time of his death. His family and friends will remember him as an advocate for others and especially committed to racial and economic justice.

A funeral service was held on Friday, March 23, at Orrville Mennonite Church with Pastor Bill Seymour officiating. A time for friends and family to call was held at Short Funeral Home, Archbold, on Saturday, March 24. Burial was in the Pettisville Cemetery.
