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Longing for a deep encounter with God

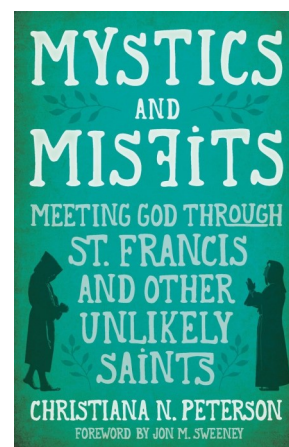
What is a mystic? Recently Bill Seymour and Thomas Dunn, hosts of the Ohio Conference Cast podcast, explored this question and more with Christiana Peterson, a member of Midway Mennonite Church and the author of the new Herald Press book titled *Mystics and Misfits: Meeting God Through St. Francis and Other Unlikely Saints*.

"Being a mystic in my definition is ... longing for a deep encounter with God," says Christiana. During the podcast, she talks with Bill and Thomas about the book, which deals with her family's experience at Plow Creek, a Mennonite inten-

tional community and farm in Illinois. She describes the book as part memoir, part saint biography, and part letters to the mystics, such as St. Francis.

Listen to this episode to find out whether reading Wendell Berry books and communal farming really go together. You'll also hear Christiana talk about what happened to the Plow Creek community and hear her thoughts about living a life of simplicity.

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SEMILLA Learning Tour

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Experience firsthand and up close how God's Spirit is working among Anabaptist believers in Central America. If you are worried about lacking fluency in Spanish, don't let that be a barrier to taking part in this tour. Translation is provided, so participants do not need to know Spanish.

I was blessed and challenged by this tour in April of 2017, learning about the work of SEMILLA — Latin American Anabaptist Seminary. The seminary, located in Guatemala City, Guatemala, began in 1984. SEMILLA offers biblical, theological and pastoral training, serving more than 700 students from the region. Many of these students live far from Guatemala City, but they can participate in classes in learning centers throughout Central America.

In addition to providing theological training, SEMILLA provides language study, service opportunities and cultural immersion programs for more than 250 North Americans each year through CASAS, the Central America Study and Service Program.

SEMILLA also operates Casa Emaús, a guesthouse which hosts as many as 9,000 visitors and service group participants each year.

During my tour in April 2017, I was deeply moved while learning about the devastating 36-year civil war that claimed thousands of lives, mostly those of indigenous Mayan background. In spite of such traumatic suffering, God's people are rebuilding their lives and commu-

nities. SEMILLA is a key part of that restoration, training hundreds of bi-vocational national pastors, mostly in rural areas.

After so many years of devastating war, God is indeed doing a new thing in Guatemala and in much of Latin America. God is using the local, indigenous people. It is not a paternalistic, colonialist type of church growth movement.

This trip was also a significant connection to my present work with Hispanic students at Dover High School, 95 percent of whom are Guatemalan. They were delighted with my reports about my time in their country.

Why missional?

What is my motivation? Why do I do what I do? What is my end goal? What am I valuing above anything else that would inspire me to behave the way in which I am behaving?

As Mennonite people, deeply rooted in tradition, history, and a strong communal story, we need to ask this question, “What is my motivation?” before we can ever really move toward becoming a missional people.

Why missional? Why now? What is our motivation? What is our purpose?

We need to ask because the answer to this question will determine whether or not you will be satisfied with the results

of a very intentional, time-consuming process, or whether you are met with a gaping hole filled with disappointment.

How you determine your motivation needs to be based upon your highest values, your greatest goals, your deepest loves, and your ultimate aspirations.

BE HONEST WITH YOURSELF!

What is your church’s motivation? What are its highest values, greatest goals, deepest loves, and communal aspirations?

What does it look like to be a “successful church,” according to your church’s culture or according to you? How do we know when we are getting it right?

I love the saying, “What you measure improves. What you

celebrate gets repeated.”

What do we measure, and what do we celebrate? And how does that compare with what Jesus measured and celebrated?

Take some time to consider:

1. What are the top three values we hold as a congregation? How do we measure these values?
2. What are the top three stories we tell about ourselves? What do these stories celebrate?
3. How do these values and stories affect the way we behave as a community? How do they affect the way we behave with each other? How do they affect the way we behave towards those “outside” of our church? ■

Let the Bible Speak addresses common questions

Where do we find answers to the great question we all have about life and faith? Do you ever find yourself asking questions such as these: Where do we find truth? What is faith? Is my life significant? Why bother with church? Why is there so much evil in the world? Will I make it to heaven?

J. David Eshleman has wrestled with these questions, and he addresses them in his new book, *Let the Bible Speak for Itself, 101 Essays on Questions We All Ask*, published by

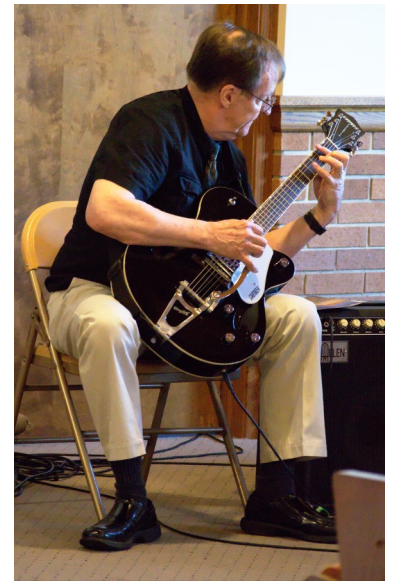
ChurchSmart Resources. With the heart of a pastor, he guides the reader into a meaningful understanding and relationship with the God who gives us life.

David has served as pastor in several Ohio Conference churches during 25 of his 50 years in pastoral ministry. In recent years he has served as a church consultant with Lancaster Mennonite Conference to more than 70 congregations. He is presently assisting his son in pastoring LifeBridge Community Church in Dover. He is the

author of numerous books, including *Share the Irresistible Story of Jesus*, published by ChurchSmart Resources and *Now Go Forward, Reaching Out to Grow Your Congregation*, published by Herald Press. He and his wife, Helen, ministered via shortwave radio with a daily dialogue program, “Making Disciples” through World Harvest Radio.

Berean Fellowship Church passes the baton

The members of Berean Fellowship Church have decided to close the congregation after more than 50 years of ministry in Youngstown. The congregation was founded in 1961.

The congregation held a closing worship service on Sunday afternoon, July 1. During the worship service, Pastor Samuel Olarewaju talked about how the congregation decided to close and sell the building to another congregation, Mercy Community Church. He emphasized that although Berean Fellowship Church has come to an end, the church of Christ in Youngstown lives on. Berean Fellowship is handing over the

baton to the new congregation, he said.

The worship service included the singing of “God Will Make a Way” and “Move with the Clouds.” The lyrics of “Move with the Clouds,” which reference God’s leading the Children of Israel with a cloud by day, include these lines: “Let your spirit arise and your strength be renewed/Come on let us all move together/As we follow where he leads a new life we will receive/If we move with the cloud.” In his remarks, Pastor Samuel Olarewaju commented that the congregation looked to God for direction as they made decisions. “We kept moving with the cloud,” he said.

The worship service also included sharing from congregation members, as well as former pastors Richard and Maxine Bartholomew; Bob Wengered, the pastor of North Lima Mennonite Church, who had served as a mentor to Samuel Olarewaju; Ernest Martin, who had served as the overseer of Berean Fellowship years ago; and Cliff Brubaker, Ohio Conference regional pastor.

A reception was held in the church fellowship hall after the worship service.

is the child of Janine and Jeffery Kauffman.

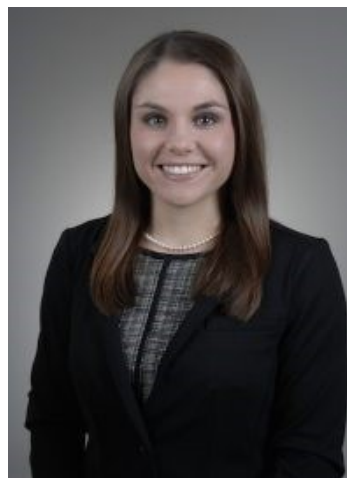

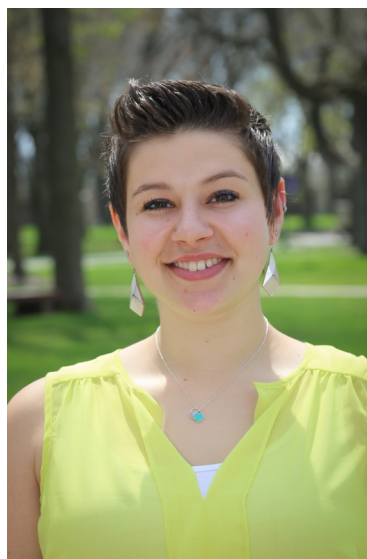

Students who complete this summer inquiry successfully are awarded a \$2,000 tuition scholarship toward their Mennonite college or seminary education. ■

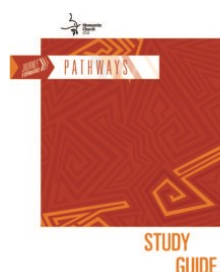
