

## Failing vs. not trying

What stops us from taking bold steps when we are seeking to join God in mission? I would guess that many times we are reluctant to try things because we are afraid that they just won't work.

At a cluster meeting for delegates to Annual Conference Assembly, as Conference Minister Dick Barrett invited the delegates to talk about activity in their congregations, he encouraged everyone to not only

share their successes, but also things that did not work out. "We do want to know if you fail, because that's part of the process," he said. He noted that the congregation he pastored, Oak Grove in West Liberty, has experimented with numerous programs at its in-town ministry location, The Grove. Some of those ideas have worked, and some have not. But none of them would have worked if they hadn't been tried.

I was reminded of a quote saw recently, which has been attributed to hockey star Wayne Gretzky: "You miss 100 percent of the shots you don't take." I admit that I am not a great risk taker. And yet, if we are waiting for the perfect opportunity that can't fail before we step out in mission, there is a good chance that we will never actually take that step. Is that really any better than trying and failing?

In his letter to delegates, Ohio Conference Moderator Bob Sauder noted, "We are designating this year as a year of celebration! We are celebrating 50 years of service as the Ohio Conference, the hiring of a new conference minister, and the introduction of a new executive director of Mennonite Church USA."

On Friday evening the Conference will hold a special reception for new Conference Minister Dick Barrett and for Glen Guyton, the new executive di-

rector of Mennonite Church USA. The reception will take place at 9 p.m., following the evening worship service, which will be held at Sonnenberg Mennonite Church in Kidron. Registration for ACA will begin Friday, March 8, at 12:30 p.m.

The first business session for delegates will begin at 1:30 p.m. ACA will conclude at 4 p.m. on Saturday after the final business session.

In addition to business sessions and worship services, ACA will include special times for prayer, workshops, and displays from church-related agencies.

On Dec. 31 I completed my time as one of the pastors of Oak Grove Mennonite Church in West Liberty (four years as associate pastor and 12 years as lead pastor). There was much sadness and grief on my part in the ending. On Jan. 2 I began full-time as conference minister for the Ohio Conference. There is much excitement and anticipation in the beginning.

The first couple of weeks have been Spirit filled. The two regional pastors, Ralph Reinford and Cliff Brubaker, and I met for half a day to envision what our roles will look like moving into the new year. Cliff just returned from medical leave after open heart surgery, and Ralph has begun serving Conference half time, down from full time.

On Sunday, Jan. 6, I had the privilege to speak and worship at Crown Hill Mennonite Church with five churches (Crown Hill, Wooster, Orrville, Salem-Wooster, and Martins), a collaboration that the churches have been participating in at different times through different activities over the past couple of years. It was a wonderful time of sharing, worship and fellowship with a great meal following.

On Jan. 8 I had the opportunity to sit in on my first Credentialing Ministry Team meeting as they interviewed one pastor who is transferring into Conference to serve at one of our congregations and two who were approved for licensing toward ordination. What amazed me was the diversity of the individuals, both in their callings to ministry and their life experiences, as well as their anticipation and excitement for serving God in the context of Ohio Conference of Mennonite Church USA. It was impossible to sit in on those interviews and not be excited about our future together.

It seems like I have started at the Conference's busiest time of the year. We are gearing up for Annual Conference Assembly on March 8-9 at Salem Mennonite Church in Kidron. This year we will be celebrating Ohio Conference's 50th anniversary. Prior to the annual assembly, on Thursday evening, March 7, and Friday morning, March 8, we will once again be hosting a missional seminar. The title of this year's seminar is "From Jerusalem to Antioch: Legacy Churches Anchoring Missional Communities." The two guest speakers are Sally Schreiner Youngquist, a community leader from Reba Place Fellowship in Evanston, Illinois, and Rev. Steve North, who is a community ministry leader in the inner city of Toledo. I want to encourage both church lead-



ers, as well as members and attendees, especially those who are community and missionally minded, to attend.

## Salem congregation moves into new building



The Salem Mennonite Church congregation in Waldron, Michigan, held the first worship service in its new building on Sunday, Dec. 9, 2018.

Two and a half years after breaking ground for a new church building, the Salem Mennonite Church congregation in Waldron, Michigan, has begun worshipping in its new facility.

The first worship service in the new building took place on Sunday, Dec. 9. On that day, the congregation met in the lobby of the old church building and marched out together, singing "You shall go out with joy." It was noted that in the Bible

"shall" is not a suggestion, but rather a mandate.

Ohio Conference Moderator Bob Sauder, a member of Salem Mennonite, noted that while it took two and a half years to go from groundbreaking to movein, members of the congregation began dreaming about constructing a new facility more than 20 years ago. He said that up to this point, the congregation has kept borrowing for the construction project to a minimum.

A grant from the Ohio Conference Ministry Development
Team helped to fund the construction of a coffee bar area in the lobby of the new building.
The cabinets in the coffee bar area were made from pine trees that were cut from the church property in order to access the site.

While the congregation has begun worshiping in the new building, some parts of the project remain unfinished. Work still is needed on several areas, such as the kitchen, carport, parking areas and landscaping.

something I always thought about but at the same time didn't think was a realistic option for me."

Miller, who attends Silverwood Mennonite Church in Goshen, took a leap of faith and enrolled in Journey: A Missional Leadership Development Program, a distance-friendly undergraduate-level nondegree program designed to serve as a starting place for Anabaptist pastoral and theological education for Christian leaders. Several persons from the Ohio Conference are now participating in this program.

Offered by the Church Leadership Center of Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS) in Elkhart, Indiana, in cooperation with two conferences of Mennonite Church USA — Central District and Indiana-Michigan — Journey pairs online instruction with an ongoing mentoring relationship in which participants discuss their learnings and reflect on their leadership skills. Participants complete introductory studies in Bible, missional leadership, Anabaptist history and theology, pastoral care, preaching and worship planning while also deepening their practice of spiritual disciplines.

The program has given Miller, now in his third year, an opportunity to explore a nudge toward pastoral ministry while continuing to work in his concrete business.

"I am a different person than I was two years ago," he said.

"My interests and priorities have changed. Journey is shaping me into something different, and I can only describe that as, God is working in my life."

#### A NEW DESIGN

The Journey curriculum, which was also used for the seminary's former Pastoral Studies Distance Education program, was recently redesigned to be more flexible and accessible by David B. Miller, D.Min., teaching associate of the Church Leadership Center. It now consists of online classes that incorporate video lectures, assigned readings, brief written essays, and opportunities for participants to interact with each other and their pastoral guides — pastors Donna Mast of Goshen, Indiana, and Duane Beck of Raleigh, North Carolina — through discussion boards and occasional videoconferences.

"[The video lectures] were filled with new ways of looking at things I thought I had known," said Jan Croyle, a second-year participant from First Mennonite Church of Wadsworth, Ohio. "I found it interesting and helpful to read the other participants' essays. It seemed we either had a lot in common or else touched on totally different ideas."

Journey participants meet with a local pastoral mentor every two weeks and gather for faceto-face Weekend Learning Events with other participants and mentors once or twice a year. Upon fulfilling the pro-

gram requirements — which can take two and a half to three years — participants receive a certificate of completion. Fortyone people have completed the program since it began in 2003.

Journey is now open to anyone in the world, noted Jewel Gingerich Longenecker, dean of Lifelong Learning at AMBS. When the program began, it was jointly owned by AMBS, Central District and Indiana-Michigan Mennonite conferences, and participants came primarily from these conferences.

"Last year, ownership and administrative oversight of the program were transferred to AMBS, with Central District and Indiana-Michigan signing on as the first 'sponsoring conferences," she said. "This change opened up the possibility for participants from any conference or denomination to attend, and for any conference to become a sponsoring conference."

This year's 17 participants — II men and 6 women — come from five conferences affiliated with Mennonite Church USA (Central District, Illinois, Indiana-Michigan, Ohio, Pacific Southwest); one regional church affiliated with Mennonite Church Canada (Mennonite Church Eastern Canada); and one district of the Missionary Church (North Central). Two participants also identify as Lutheran and Pentecostal.

## MENTORING AS ACCOMPANIMENT

According to Gingerich Longenecker, the mentoring component of the Journey program plays a significant role in its success.

"Our goal for the mentoring relationships is that participants will experience spiritual and theological reflection on leadership, guidance in wise practice of leadership skills, and a biblical vision of effective leadership for a changing world," she said.

Keith Kingsley of Fellowship of Hope in Elkhart, Indiana, who has mentored three Journey participants, sees Journey as helping encourage and empower people with ministry gifts who might not otherwise find their way into church ministry.

"More than 'teacher' or

'supervisor,' I see my role as that of 'accompanier' — a privileged position allowing me to experience the work of God in another's life and surroundings," he noted. "Insofar as I can be transparent with my mentees, I believe they also experience the benefit of perceiving some of God's work in my life. There is a mutuality here that graces our journey together."

#### 'YOU'RE AMONG FRIENDS'

Journey's Weekend Learning Events — typically held in September and February at or near AMBS — offer a setting for mentors, mentees, conference leaders, AMBS faculty members and other instructors to gather in person for worship, prayer, learning, fellowship and mutual support.

At the September 2018 event at Amigo Centre in Sturgis, Michigan, Miller told those attending, "All you first-time people here, I just want you to know: you're among friends. These weekends are special, and you'll never forget them."

Gingerich Longenecker also spoke of feeling buoyed by the gathering, which brought together people from many different backgrounds. This year's participants' home countries include Belize, Bhutan, Congo, Nepal, Nigeria and South Sudan, as well as Canada and the United States. In addition to ministry, their vocations include counseling, insurance sales, health care and personal support, social work, education, piano teaching, administrative


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
## Giving increases during December

Giving to Ohio Conference increased greatly during December, according to figures provided by Financial Coordinator Stan Helmuth. In fact, the amount received in December was more than double the amount received in any other month of the current fiscal year.

Receipts for December totaled \$60,171. Of that amount, \$41,174 came from congregational giving. During December giving from individuals was also very strong. In response to a year-end appeal from Conference Moderator Bob Sauder, individuals gave a total of \$15,133.

Expenses for the month totaled just \$30,041, resulting in a surplus of \$30,130 for the month. As a result, the Conference operating balance was -\$6,446 at the end of December, a great improvement from the balance at the end of November, -\$36,576. Thank you to all who contributed! The Conference fiscal year ends March 31, 2019.

#### Pastoral notes


