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# In an anxious time: Be still and know that I am God

God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging.

There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy place where the Most High dwells. God is within her, she will not fall; God will help her at break of day. Nations are in uproar, kingdoms fall; he lifts his voice, the earth melts.

We find ourselves in some very anxious times. I have heard many commentators on television use the word "unprecedented." I would challenge that idea. Perhaps what we are experiencing today in the United States is unprecedented in most of our lifetimes, but it is certainly not unprecedented in the history of other countries and especially in the history of the world. As a biblical people, we know the Scriptures are full of stories of people who experienced situations similar to this, some much worse.

# Giving slows in February

After strong levels of congregational giving in December and January, Ohio Conference experienced a drop in receipts during February. According to figures provided by Financial Coordinator Stan Helmuth, receipts for February totaled just \$14,770, including \$14,664 in giving from congregations. Expenses for the month totaled \$23,369, resulting in an operating balance of -\$8,559 for the month. Even so, that shortfall was not enough to bring the year-to-date operating balance back into negative territory. As of the end of February, the year-to-date operating balance stands at **\$13,555**. The Conference fiscal year ends March 31, 2020.
