

Worshiping together at MennoCon21

MennoCon21 is less than 70 days away. Plans continue for a hybrid convention. Participants can join in person in Cincinnati, Ohio, or online in their homes. **Registration is open for both options**. After registering, those who are planning to attend in person can make hotel reservations through Passkey, our online registration system.

This newsletter will highlight the worship services and seminars. In-person and online participants will experience the same worship services, while seminars will feature distinct options for in-person and online participants.

Morning worship

Morning worship will feature music, readings and other elements from *Voices Together*, along with a Bible study. Benjamin Bergey, Katie Graber, Marcos Acosta and Shannon Dycus will lead participants in the *Voices Together* portion of the service. With in-person *Voices Together* launch events having been cancelled, morning worship gives convention participants the chance to experience, firsthand, what *Voices Together* has to offer.











Morning worship will also include a Bible study, led by Safwat Marzouk, Ph.D., with the theme of "Shalom Justice Amidst Pandemic and Racism." Individual services will focus on Pandemic, Lament and Repentance (Psalm 74); Justice and Reconciliation in the Joseph Story (Genesis 45:1-8); and Strategies to Resist Xenophobia (Exodus 1:8-2:10).

Marzouk is the associate professor of Hebrew Bible/Old Testament at Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary. He is an ordained minister with the Presbyterian Church in Egypt and is a member of the Wabash Valley Presbytery. He has pastored

in Alexandria, Egypt, as well as in Jersey City, New Jersey, while he was finishing his doctorate at Princeton (New Jersey) Theological Seminary. In addition to writing numerous articles and book chapters, he is the author of two books: *Egypt as a Monster in the Book of Ezekiel* and *Intercultural Church: A Biblical Vision for an Age of Migration*. His scholarship, teaching and preaching center around how Christian Egyptians engage with the Old Testament, as they seek to live into God's mission of peace and justice in their own context. He also works on how to read the Bible with and through the eyes of migrants, refugees and asylum-seekers to proclaim a vision of hospitality, justice and integration that moves beyond the politics of assimilation and segregation.

Each worship service will also include a time of singing contemporary and traditional praise songs with the MennoCon21 worship band, led by Seth Thomas Crissman. He is an educator, musician and pastor in Mennonite Church USA, who has lived in Harrisonburg, Virginia, for 16 years, though he still says, "Western Pennsylvania," when people ask where he's from. Crissman is a follower of Jesus, who has spent the past 10 years helping churches work together to better give and receive God's love in their neighborhoods and local communities. He is also a songwriter and musician for the folk group, The Walking Roots Band. Crissman and his wife have four small children. Crissman has served at convention for many years and is excited to help again this year.

Adult Seminars

A broad range of seminar topics will be offered online, as well as in person in Cincinnati. There are two seminar designations: "Adult Seminars" are open to all interested persons, and "Youth Seminars" are designed specifically for youth.

Online seminars will be available to watch on demand. Each seminar will have a scheduled time when the presenter will join the virtual platform to engage with participants via the chat feature.

In-person seminars are typically 60 minutes in length and cover a variety of categories, including church vitality, leadership development, peace and justice, health and well-being, stewardship, and youth ministry. They are scheduled each morning and afternoon, except for the afternoon of July 8.

COVID-19 Protocols

Many people have asked what the expectations are around COVID-19 protocols for those gathering in Cincinnati for MennoCon21. The convention planning team has added a <u>"Protocols and Expectations"</u> page to the MennoCon21 website, which lists current protocols. Convention planning staff are following Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), state and local guidelines in setting these protocols. If anything changes, the webpage will be updated immediately. Anyone registered will also be notified, via email, if protocols change.

Per Ohio guidelines, meeting rooms will be set up according to physical distancing guidelines. Also, anyone performing or presenting on stage will not be required to wear a mask. Audience members will still be required to wear masks at all times. It is anticipated that any member of the band that is singing will be fully vaccinated before convention. Abiding by these protocols makes it possible for us to gather together in person in Cincinnati for this convention.

Hybrid options

You can register for the in-person or virtual convention on the same form. Whether joining in person or virtually, you will have meaningful material to enjoy. If you do choose to register for the in-person portion, you have the option to add access to view and explore the virtual platform for an additional \$10. This will give you access to the virtual worship services, seminars and more until the end of July!

Lunches

For those who choose the in-person option, lunches will be included with your registration.

Servant projects

Servant Projects will have a creative revamp at MennoCon21 due to COVID-19 restrictions. Coordinated by Mennonite Mission Network, these in-person community service activities will be replaced with Service in a Box. This resource will provide all registrants with materials designed to inspire them to engage in service in their local communities.
