Aug. I is the deadline to submit a grant proposal to the Ohio Conference Ministry Development Team (MDT). The MDT is accepting proposals from Ohio Conference congregations and related ministries for projects and mission initiatives.
This year the MDT has

\$15,225 available for grants.

Since 2012 the MDT has awarded grants each summer, providing funds for a wide variety of projects and mission initiatives. If your congregation is looking for a way to fund a ministry that would impact your community, consider applying for a Ministry Grant.

Resources address challenging issues

This month I would like to highlight a new Sunday school resource from Mennonite Central Committee and RAW-tools, as well as a webinar from Anabaptist Disabilities Network and Everence.



How do we respond to violence in our homes and churches? Does our faith have anything to say about how we understand safety and how we put into practice habits of safekeeping in our homes, churches and communities?

MCC U.S. and RAWtools have partnered on a Sunday school curriculum designed to help congregations consider the balance of physical safety with a commitment to nonviolence in the face of active violence.



The 12-week study guide is titled FEAR NOT: Creating a plan to respond to active violence. This curriculum can guide congregations to consider what they believe about situations of active violence and how they can respond effectively and faithfully as followers of Jesus Christ.

The goal of this curriculum is not to prescribe answers but rather to raise important questions that will propel a congregation toward making a plan for its unique context.

AFTER WE'RE GONE

Caring for someone who is dependent due to a significant disability is a major responsibility. Making provisions for that person's physical, emotional, and financial well-being after the death of the caregiver can be complex and confusing.

On March 31 Anabaptist Disbilities Network (ADN) and Everence offered a webinar which focused on these issues. The webinar, titled After We're Gone: Disabilities and Estate Planning, featured Dennis LeFevre, Jennifer Lyle, Jeanne Davies (ADN executive director), Lyle Miller (Everence), and Mitchell Stutzman (Everence, ADN Board of Directors). The primary consultant will be Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi. Jeanne has almost 30 years of experience in strategic planning and process consulting with Mennonite Central Committee in DR Congo, Nigeria, Indonesia, Southeast Asia and in U.S.-based settings. Jeanne is a member of Orrville Mennonite Church.

The feedback from many of the delegates at Annual Conference Assembly stressed the importance that the consultant be of Anabaptist/Mennonite faith and have some knowledge of the inner workings of our congregations and Ohio Conference, while not being so close that he or she might not be able to be objective and unbiased. The Leadership Team feels that Jeanne's faith background, her qualifications and experience, and the fact that she has not been an active part in Ohio Conference life for the past 30 years make her the right choice for Conference at this time. Jeanne has been tasked with facilitating the work of Conference staff and volunteers in three main areas:

 Developing a process to review and make a decision about our future affiliation with MC USA;



 Developing a structure that fits with who Ohio Conference is today based on our new mission statement that was unanimously affirmed by our delegates at the 2022 Annual Conference Assembly; and

3. Revising our Constitution.

The Leadership Team sees all three of these areas as being interrelated, needing to be addressed together as we discern God's vision and purpose for Ohio Conference and our congregations into the future. While there will be some overlap in the two-year process, we envision that much of the first year will be focused on the discernment and decision making, and the second year focused on the implementation of the decisions and the revising of the Constitution.

The strategic planning process will actively involve stakeholders from across the Conference with the desire to build enthusiasm, cohesiveness and forward thinking for Ohio Conference. This process is an opportunity to be proactive rather than reactive. Among many other things, the two-year agreement includes the following commitments by the consultant:

- Facilitating an all-day Leadership Team retreat on April 28, 2022
- Facilitating a gathering of the Ministry Development Team in late spring or early summer 2022
- Facilitating a gathering of all credentialed ministers in late summer/early fall 2022
- Facilitating the gatherings of delegates in the fall 2022 and early 2023

CONFERENCE MINISTER MUSINGS

A Year of Discernment

There is no doubt that the past two years have been both different and difficult on our churches. In one sense, as Mennonites/ Anabaptists we don't find ourselves to be any different from other Christian churches throughout America. Almost all congregations can say that their church has lost members and attenders, and the church doesn't look the same as it did before the **COVID** pandemic began.

Many in our Mennonite churches have been drawn to the writings and podcasts of Conrad Kanagy titled "A Church Dismantled." His main thesis is that through all that is occurring in the beginning of the 21st century, including the COVID pandemic, God is allowing his church(es) to be dismantled. It is our responsibility as Christians (pastors, leaders, members and attenders) to see how God is working during this dismantling season and embrace who he is calling us to be as we move to the middle of the 21st century.

In the second volume in his series, Kanagy writes, "Any church meeting that begins without asking what the Spirit is saying and acknowledging that Christ is present, will never be the church that is able to break the rules needed to make the changes required in this dismantling season."— Ministry in a Church Dismantled, p. 43

One definition of Christian discernment says that it "involves the community of believers gathered in Jesus' name around Scripture in the presence of the Holy Spirit to find its way through." It is no coincidence that the author of this definition, Michael King, is a Mennonite. This definition incorporates what have been the essential elements of discernment for Mennonite/Anabaptist Christians throughout our 500-year history — it is done in the community of believers who are gathered in Jesus' name, grounded in Scripture, and in the presence of the Holy Spirit.

At our recent Ohio Conference Annual Assembly our delegates approved a new mission statement as we move into the future: "The mission of Ohio Conference is to Gather, Equip and Send our congregations by the power of the Holy Spirit to live out God's Greatest Commandments (Mark 12:29-31) and Jesus' Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20)."

The next task for us as the community of believers making up Ohio Conference is to discern together, around Scripture and in the presence of the Holy Spirit, where God is leading us in the years ahead after this



dismantling season. What should the structure of Ohio Conference look like to empower us to live out our new mission statement in the years ahead, and will our affiliation with Mennonite Church USA help or hinder us in faithfulness to that mission?

We are blessed to have Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi of Design Group International, a lifelong Mennonite/Anabaptist Christian and a member of one of our congregations, to help guide us in the discernment that will take place over the next year. On April 28, 2022, she facilitated a daylong retreat for the Leadership Team and pastoral staff. It was a great day of relationship building and discernment to get a sense of how Conference leadership sees God at work in our Conference and among our congregations. Her next steps will be to gather our credentialed ministers for a one-day retreat in late summer

- Supporting a Strategic Planning Ad Hoc Committee as they compile a concise Strategic Plan to be ready for a delegate vote at the Annual Conference Assembly, March 3-4, 2023. The Strategic Plan will include a new leadership structure to provide a leaner and more effective way to implement the vision and mission of the Conference as well as affiliation options.
- With the Strategic Plan in place, the work of 2023 will be to revise the Ohio Conference constitution. preparing for the final revision to be voted on at the Annual Conference Assembly in March, 2024. The consultant will facilitate the work of an ad hoc constitution committee.

As the Leadership Team, we are looking forward to Jeanne helping us, our other leaders and staff, our credentialed ministers, delegates, and other congregational members as we discern God's future vision for us as a conference. The MDT will use several criteria in reviewing the applications:

- Does this proposal fit with the Conference priorities of Loving God, Loving Others, and Making Disciples of Jesus Christ?
- Does this project respond to the priorities identified by Ministry Development Team?
- Start-up ministries/new initiatives
- Community outreach
- Church planting
- Focus on children or youth ministry that includes an outreach component
- Missional coaching
- Peacemaking education/action
- Immigration education/action
- Antiracism education/action

- Initiatives which cross cultural boundaries
- Is this proposal a collaborative effort among Ohio Conference congregations and/or related organizations?

Please note that this is a onetime grant. Grant monies are not intended to be used for staffing.

Grant proposals are due by Aug I, 2022. More information and an online application are on the Ohio Conference website: http://bit.ly/OCMinistryGrants. If you prefer, you may download a grant form and mail it to the Ohio Conference office.

The Ministry Development Team will consider all grant proposals at its August meeting.



Conference ends fiscal year with a deficit

Ohio Conference ended its 2021-22 fiscal year with a deficit of \$12,504, according to figures provided by Financial Coordinator Stan Helmuth. The fiscal year ended March 31, 2022.

The Conference began March with a small positive operating balance of \$245. Receipts for March totaled \$29,465, including \$28,676 in giving from congregations. Expenses for the month totaled \$42,214, resulting in a deficit of \$12,749 for the month. ■
