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view of sexual ethics and marriage included in MC USA's recently adopted "Repentance and Transformation" resolution is one of the concerns, other concerns have been expressed as well. We thank you for your feedback and want to encourage all our pastors, delegates and congregational leaders to communicate with our pastoral staff (Dick Barrett, Sherah-Leigh Gerber and Tony Doehrmann) as well as anyone from the Leadership Team².

The Leadership Team of Ohio Conference believes it is important to stay faithful to the review/discernment process that we started on April I. On April 28, our process consultant, Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi, facilitated an all-day retreat with the Leadership Team in Upper Sandusky. On June 15 we hosted a luncheon for our congregational pastors at Der Dutchman Restaurant in Plain City to debrief following MC USA's special delegate assembly and to

encourage one another. On Aug. 23 Jeanne will be facilitating a day for all of our active credentialed ministers. We are in the process of scheduling regional cluster meetings for our congregational delegates for the end of September and/or early October. By the end of the year, we should have a good sense of where our pastors and congregations are at and what options there will be for both the Conference and our congregations. In the beginning of the new year, we will continue discernment with our credentialed ministers and delegates as we prepare for decision making at our 2023 Annual Conference Assembly on March 3-4, 2023, in Kidron.

Christian spiritual discernment is not easy, and it takes commitment from all the people involved. As Anabaptists and Mennonites, discernment and decision making does not just include people in leadership positions, or pastors, but all the

people from all our congregations. It must be done with solid biblical understanding and the Holy Spirit. It will take much prayer and fasting to discern God's leading, both for us as a conference and for each of our congregations. In the coming weeks we will be providing resources to help us engage in spiritual practices as we seek to discern God's will together.

CONFERENCE MINISTER MUSINGS

Dwelling in the Word

As we are early in this season of trying to discern God's will for us together as a conference of Mennonite churches across Ohio and our neighboring states, it is very important to make sure that each of our hearts, minds and souls is prepared for the process. Even as individual Christians, discerning God's will for our lives is not always easy. As congregations, discernment becomes exponentially more difficult, and even more so for a conference and/or denomination of churches.

Christian biblical spiritual discernment is not easy and takes commitment from all the people involved. Anabaptists and Mennonites have traditionally included all of our people in discernment processes, especially as we seek God's will on important decisions. In order for us to discern God's will as best we can, it is important for us to engage is spiritual disciplines. While many of us engage in specific spiritual disciplines most of the time, there are seasons in the life of a church when it is appropriate for us to engage in some spiritual disciplines together. In the current season of our congregations and conference this seems to

be one of those times. At Ohio Conference's Annual Conference Assembly on March 4-5, 2022 there were four spiritual disciplines that were recommended several times by our delegates to engage in together during our year of review: I) Dwelling in the Word; 2) Communal Discernment; 3) Prayer; and 4) Fasting.

What if most of us in Ohio Conference were able to commit together to reading the New Testament over the course of the next six months, learning more about and engaging in communal discernment, setting a time each day/week for prayer, and fasting for one meal each week? Would we be able to see God's will for our future together more clearly? I believe that the answer to that question is yes. Over the course of the next several months I and several others are going to be spending time through written communication and in podcasts inviting and encouraging as many people as possible from Ohio Conference to actively participate in each of these four spiritual disciplines, starting with "Dwelling in the Word."

"Since the beginning of the Anabaptist reformation, Mennonites have sought to be a biblical people in ways that both borrowed from the Protestant reformation and differed from it. Mennonites have shared the traditional Protestant emphasis



on the authority of Scripture for doctrine. In addition, Mennonites have underscored the following emphases:


- the authority of Scripture for ethics, for the relation of the church to society, and for church polity.
- the interpretation of Scripture in harmony with Jesus Christ, in the sense that his life, teachings, death and resurrection are essential to understanding the Bible as a whole.
- the congregation of believers as the place where individual understandings and interpretations of Scripture are to be tested."
 Confession of Faith in a Mennonite Perspective, Article 4

All of us are guilty at times of "proof texting" – picking certain passages of Scripture to sup-

port what we already believe or what we want to focus on. One of the ways to avoid proof texting is to read through a larger amount of scripture, allowing God to speak to us through his written word. Historically, Anabaptists have given emphasis to Jesus' Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), the four gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) and the entire New Testament.

Beginning this month I am inviting all of us in Ohio Conference to read through the entire New Testament by the end of the year. For those who are currently following a Bible reading schedule, especially if it is one that your congregation is encouraging, please continue to follow that schedule. Feel free to add the six-month schedule if you so desire. Reading

through the entire New Testament in less than six months requires reading only two chapters per day. On our Ohio Conference website, you can find a suggested reading schedule beginning the week of July 17, with readings Monday through Saturday, and Sunday to take off or to catch up. Over the course of the next six months, whenever we gather together, in whatever setting it may be (conference/ congregational meetings, delegate cluster meetings, Sunday school, small group, etc.) may we take some time to share how we hear God speaking to us, our church, and/or our conference through his Word.

It was a time of fellowship and a chance to debrief after Mennonite Church USA's special delegate assembly in Kansas City, Missouri, which was held May 27-30. There were 30 pastors present, representing 24 congregations. 
Conference deficit continues

Ohio Conference's financial deficit increased during the month of June, according to figures provided by Financial Coordinator Stan Helmuth.

Receipts during June totaled \$32,307, including \$27,238 in giving from congregations. Expenses during June totaled

\$32,870, resulting in a deficit of \$563 for the month.

As of June 30, the Conference's operating balance for the 2022-23 fiscal year was -\$25,538. The fiscal year ends March 31, 2023.

Pastoral notes

One of the questions asked in
that interview is this:
"Comment on your understanding of ordination - what
does it mean to you; how will it
make a difference in your ministry?"

Tony shared Sue's response to that question with the congregation:

"My understanding is that ordination is a covenantal relationship between a congregation, the licensed candidate, and ultimately, God. During the licensing period, the congregation

discerns the calling and gifts of the pastor, while the pastor also engages in discernment. While licensing is similar to a 'trial period,' once ordained, it is intended to be a lifetime commitment to ministry and to the church. Ordination is an affirmation of the pastor for ministry leadership by the congregation, the conference, and the denomination.

"Personally, I view ordination as a sacred trust offered to the pastor by the congregation. It is a gift of good faith. An ordained pastor is ideally a person of the utmost character, committed to humbly leading the congregation, faithfully preaching and serving, and desiring to grow in discipleship and spiritual maturity, even as the pastor disciples others. It is not a commitment nor a trust that I ever want to take lightly. I am both thrilled and terrified to think about it.

"As it relates to my ministry at Zion Mennonite Church, I believe ordination communicates my commitment to use my gifts to serve this body of believers.

It is my promise to fully live into the role to which God and the congregation have called me. It is my covenant of love to my brothers and sisters."

As a congregational response, Bonnie Stuckey, Mark Nafziger, Barb Yoder, and Mike Zimmerman shared blessings for Sue from the congregation.

Following the worship service, the congregation celebrated Sue's ordination with a baked potato bar, complete with cookies and ice cream.

Vanita Mae Tadeo, age 86, of Orrville, died Sunday, June 26, at LifeCare Hospice in Wooster, following a period of declining health. She and her husband, Raul, were instrumental in the founding of Open Arms Hispanic Ministries.

Vanita was born on Aug. 22, 1935, in Dalton, Ohio, to the late Ray and Rhoda (Burkhart) Horst. She earned her degree as a registered nurse from Salem City Hospital in 1956. In 1957 she moved to Mathis, Texas to serve for a year in the Voluntary Service (VS) program of the Mennonite church. She worked in the maternity clinic that served Hispanic migrants. While in Texas she met Raul Tadeo, who was also serving in

the VS program. In 1959 she married Raul, who survives.

In 1969 Vanita and Raul moved to the mission field of Sinaloa, Mexico.

In 1991 after serving 23 years in the mission field the Tadeos returned from Mexico and purchased a home in Dalton. During the following years Vanita worked at the Mount Eaton Care Center, retiring in 2013. She also served as a translator with Open Arms Ministries, translating for Hispanic women arriving in Wayne County from Mexico and Central American countries.

Surviving are a daughter, Jeanette M. (Paul) Weaver of Pandora; a son, Ken A. (Dawn) Tadeo of Middlebury, Indiana; two brothers, Willis (June) Horst, Mervin Horst; sister, Emma (Paul) Kauffman; sister-in-law, Eva Jane Horst; six grandchildren, Elizabeth Weaver, Alex Weaver, Ben Weaver, Brennah (Caleb) Yoder, Braden Tadeo, Brienne Tadeo; and numerous nieces and nephews.

A memorial service was held on July 2 at Sonnenberg Mennonite Church in Kidron.
