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## Ministry Grants fund local projects

The Ohio Conference
Ministry Development
Team (MDT) has awarded three grants totaling
\$15,225. The MDT approved these grants at its
meeting on Aug. 18, 2022.
Grants will provide funds
toward the following projects:

#### Community Garden —

Grant funds will be given toward the creation of a community garden in Archbold. The goal of this project is to provide gardening space for residents of a subsidized housing complex in the area. Partnering organizations will include Zion Mennonite Church, the village of Archbold and the Archbold FISH Food Pantry.

#### Van for Akron Swahili Mennonite Church —

Grant funds will be given toward the purchase of a used 15-passenger van for use by the Akron Swahili Mennonite Church. Other congregations working with the Akron congregation to fund this purchase are Crown Hill Mennonite Church, Martins Mennonite Church, Orrville Mennonite Church, Wooster Mennonite Church, Oak Grove Mennonite Church in Smithville and



Salem Mennonite Church in Wooster. Note: This grant was previously approved in 2019, but funds were not distributed at that time due

to some outstanding issues regarding ownership and insurance. Now that Akron Swahili Mennonite Church has established itself as a church in the state of Ohio, the congregation can legally own the vehicle.

#### 3rd Street Family Green

**Space** — First Mennonite Church in Canton and Lighthouse Ministries are receiving funding toward the creation of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street Family Green Space. The project calls for investment in the empty lot across the street from the church building as a green space which will be available for the church's neighbors and neighborhood, while still remaining functional for various church and Lighthouse activities. Note: The EPA defines "green space" as land that is partly or completely covered



The 3rd Street Family Green Space was created for the enjoyment of the members of our neighborhood.

Please note that the space is not supervised. Please use at your own risk. Children using the Family Green Space must be supervised.

- So that all may enjoy the Family Green Space, please refrain from:
   put-downs, fights, or foul language

and trash can.

• 10am-8pm
• The Family Green Play Space is closed during all Church and Lighthouse programming

with grass, trees, shrubs, or other vegetation. Some examples include parks, community gardens, cemeteries, public seating areas, public plazas, and playgrounds. Grant funds will be used for signage, a picnic table

Since 2012, the Ohio Conference Ministry Development

Team has awarded Ministry Grants to Ohio Conference congregations and related groups for ministry projects.

Funding for these grants comes from funds accumulated in years in which the Conference completed the fiscal year with a surplus.


Grant funds will go toward creating a green space in Canton across the street from First Mennonite Church. Shown is a proposed design for a sign for the 3rd Street Family Green Space.

## Discerning God's will together

Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God — this is your true and proper worship.

Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is — his good, pleasing and perfect will. — Romans 12:1-2 (NIV)

Ever since becoming a Christian as an adult, Romans chapter 12 has been my favorite chapter in the Bible. For me, it seems to capture in one brief chapter what the entire Christian life is supposed to look like. In that way it is similar to Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, Matthew chapters 5 through 7. There are many similarities in what is highlighted, especially the call to nonviolence and peace: Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everyone. If it is possible and as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone (Romans 12:17-18). Wow! What a high calling. It is certainly one we cannot live out on our own, without the power of the Holy Spirit.

Just as impossible as it is to live out God's calling expressed by

the Apostle Paul in the later parts of Romans 12 without the power of the Holy Spirit, the same is true for discerning God's will expressed in the beginning. Discovering God's will, his good, pleasing and perfect will, comes only after the sacrifice, the laying down, of our own human and imperfect wills. And it comes only with continual spiritual transformation by the renewing of our minds.

As difficult as it is to discern God's will for our lives as individuals, it becomes exponentially even more difficult when we try to discern God's will together as a body of Christ — as a congregation, as a conference of congregations, and/or as a denomination.

Discerning God's will is a spiritual discipline. While there are many definitions for Christian biblical discernment, the one that our consultant, Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi, has been sharing, by Mennonite educator Michael King, seems to capture it best: "Christian discernment involves the community of believers gathering in Jesus' name around Scripture to find its way through...." Christian biblical discernment requires believers gathered in Jesus' name, around Scripture, and the power of the Holy Spirit, to test and approve what God's will is. Paul tells us to "no longer be conformed to the pattern of this world." I think Paul should have used the plural since there are so many patterns of this world we can



be conformed to. Sometimes it is patterns of this world that we are making decisions about and sometimes it is patterns of this world that have infiltrated the discernment process itself. We need to be constantly checking to see in what areas we have conformed to the patterns of this world.

Ohio Conference's year of review is synonymous with a year of discernment. We are seeking God's will together for the future of Ohio Conference. The decisions we will be making as part of the discernment process are important decisions. In order to make the wisest decisions possible, we need feedback from as many of our constituents as possible (credentialed ministers, delegates, etc.), as well as time. We need time to seek God's will through engaging in spiritual disciplines such as "dwelling in God's Word" (reading Scripture together), prayer, fasting,



solitude, silence, contemplation, etc.

Discernment literally means "to separate, to discriminate, to determine, to decide or to distinguish between two things." But other than a final step of assessing or re-assessing, making the decisions comes at the end of a discernment process. Prior to the decision-making stage is the gathering and access of information stage, followed by the identifying options stage. In her outstanding book Pursuing God's Will Together, Ruth Haley Barton writes, "An im-

portant element of discernment is the ability to ask good questions and to allow those questions to help us gather data and gain perspective. These are not questions that will get us the answers we want; rather they are questions that will elicit the deeper wisdom we need."

As a Conference of Mennonite churches across Ohio and the borders of Pennsylvania and Michigan, we are currently in the gathering and access of information stage and the beginning to identify options stage of our discernment process. My

prayer is that I myself, and all of us, will continue to be patient in the process. We owe that to the God who is the most patient to us.

Lord, we believe our life together is touched by you,

that you want something for us together and of us.

Give us ears to hear you, eyes to see you,

and hearts quickened by the motions of your Spirit.

On Aug. 23 Ohio Conference hosted a gathering of our active credentialed ministers at the Upper Sandusky Public Library. Forty-four ministers were able to attend the one-day retreat, which was facilitated by our consultant, Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi, as part of our one-year review process.

With the primary focus on discerning God's future vision for Ohio Conference based on our new mission statement to Gather, Equip and Send our Congregations by the power of the Holy Spirit to live out God's Greatest Commandment (Mark 12:29-31) and Jesus' Great Commission (Matthew 28:18-20), the day also included time for feedback about what our ministers appreciate most about Ohio Conference. Also included were an Emmaus Walk where each minister paired with another to walk and talk about how God might be speaking to us during

this time period, and a time for generating and considering future options for affiliation(s).

As with all of our recent pastor gatherings, it was a day of good fellowship and hard work as we sought God's leading together. Many expressed a strong sense of the Holy Spirit's presence throughout the day.

Seeking feedback from our credentialed ministers was the second major step in the first stage of our review process. The first step was Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi facilitating a retreat day for the Leadership Team and pastoral staff on April 28. The third step of receiving initial feedback from our primary constituents will take place when Jeanne facilitates our upcoming regional delegate gatherings during the last two weeks in September. (A virtual delegate gathering on Zoom is scheduled on Oct. 4 for those who cannot attend the gathering in their region in person.)

Delegates are the primary communicators between Ohio Conference and our congregations, so your voice is very important. In this season of review and discernment, your participation is even more important, so we want to encourage congregations to appoint delegates who will be able to participate at our fall regional delegate gatherings, our winter regional delegate gatherings at the end of January, and our Annual Conference Assembly on March 3-4, 2023, at Central Christian School in Kidron.
