send as many people as possible, not just delegates, to ACA this year as Meghan's input will be beneficial for all as she leads us in finding ways to tell the Christian story and to reignite hope in Christ, recognizing that God is breathing life among us, restoring creation, and reconciling all divided things."

In addition to presentations by Meghan Larissa Good, ACA will include a prayer time on Saturday morning, worship services, delegate business sessions, and a group session for delegates led by the Conference consultant, Jeanne Zimmerly Jantzi, which will be devoted to working on the Conference's strategic plan. Alternate activities will be available for non-delegates during the delegate sessions.

The registration fee for ACA is \$50 per person if received by Feb. 9. After that date, the registration fee will increase to \$65 per person. There is an additional charge for meals.

ACA to offer activities for non-delegates

Christ-centered non-profit serving impoverished/lowincome families in the greater Plain City area with holistic resources and programming. Their mission is to love their neighbors, act to alleviate poverty, and walk with people towards Christ. DNA would appreciate help on Friday morning unloading trucks for their food pantry.

Participating in one or more spiritual practices.

Options include Lectio Divina (reading and reflecting on scripture), Visio Divina (reflecting on a sacred image), Praying in Color, and Prayers of Lament. Explanations of each spiritual practice will be provided for participants.
