Journey: A Missional Leadership Development Program



Journey is a distance-friendly undergraduate-level program offered by Anabaptist Mennonite Biblical Seminary (AMBS). Designed for leaders and emerging leaders, this program can benefit pastors, church planters, those

exploring a call to ministry, and other congregational and community lay leaders.

In Journey, participants join with a mentor who walks with them throughout the program. As the participant learns, tries new ideas, tests new skills and

deepens self-understanding, the mentor is there to encourage, challenge, and support them.

There are three components to lourney:

- 1) Online coursework
- Weekend learning events twice a year at Amigo Centre in Sturgis, MI, and at AMBS in Elkhart, IN
- 3) Meetings with a mentor every two weeks

Ohio Conference is one of three participating conferences, along with Indiana-Michigan and Central District, sponsoring the Journey program. As a sponsoring conference, the conference minister, along with another representative from the conference, serve on the Journey Board. Currently Dan Miller as conference minister and Doug King as conference representative serve on the board. Alysa Short serves as a

student representative.

Journey is a collaboration between the student, their congregation, and the conference. According to the AMBS website, "Students from sponsoring conferences enjoy unique benefits and take on unique responsibilities in the Journey program."

Because Ohio Conference is a sponsoring conference, students are eligible for a tuition discount.

CONFERENCE MINISTER MUSINGS

Centered around Jesus

As I've been learning about Ohio Conference, hoping to hear the Spirit, and engaging in our work together, Philippians 2:5-I I is a passage that's stuck out to me. Many scholars think this was a hymn used in early church worship that exalted how he went about his mission.

Here are verses 5-8:

Let this same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus who although he was in the form of God did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but **emptied** himself,

taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form he humbled himself and became **obedient** to the point of death — even death on a cross.

This first half emphasizes that instead of seeking power and authority, Jesus gave up his realistic claim to divinity to live among us. The mission for which God sent Jesus became Jesus' top priority. To pursue this vision, Jesus "emptied himself" of his divine privilege and power to become a servant. Emptying himself didn't mean Jesus had nothing to do, but that instead of acting from the awesome position of God, he acted from a limited human position.

John's gospel illustrates this role of a servant when Jesus takes a basin and towel and washes his disciples' feet. In Philippians 3 Paul mirrors Jesus' self-emptying behavior by listing aspects of his Jewish pedigree and stating, "whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss."

Humans are incredible beings—Gifted. Capable. Worthy of love and care. Made just a little lower than God. Limited. Unable to accomplish all we can think or imagine.

Unable to do everything as a human being that he'd been able to do before, Jesus became obedient. He didn't become an unthinking automaton. Nor was he directed by remote control from heaven. Jesus prayed. He read scripture. He listened. He engaged in discussion. Rather than trying to carry the whole thing, he became obedient to God in those things that were his to do. God's mission was Jesus' priority.

Ohio Mennonite Conference's vision statement imagines a conference centered around Jesus. In such a conference, congregations are gathered, equipped and sent to love God, love others, and make disciples. If that becomes our primary purpose together, there might be obstacles to lay aside in order to live into that mission.

There could be unique obstacles for each congregation and each individual. Perhaps an Anabaptist pedigree, or the absence of one? What about a



desire for a clean and tidy life? Perhaps a reputation for being wise, and a wish that everyone would think like me? Incremental change rather than disruptive change? People of faith – in scripture and in history and in the current time – face obstacles whenever we seek to follow.

In the second half of the hymn, verses 9-11, God acts to do what only God can do: fill Jesus with resurrection life and restore him to his place in heaven. We have our part to play. By becoming obedient to our part of the work, we participate in God's mission to reconcile the world back to God without getting in God's way by taking on God's work. We contribute our part. The rest is God's.

Are there obstacles to lay down individually or as a congregational member in order to prioritize God's mission?

We spent considerable time with the Strategic Plan, particularly reviewing the goals for 2024 and 2025 to begin the work of implementation.

A plan is only as good as our ability to live into the goals we've developed. We spent time in the awareness that while we are responsible for overseeing the work, we cannot and must not be the ones doing all the implementation of the goals on behalf of the conference. Just as the Strategic Plan was developed by all our Conference stakeholders, it is essential for the whole conference to stay engaged. It is congregations, Conference committees, and individual volunteers with the assistance of Conference staff that will ultimately breathe life into this plan.

The Holy Spirit has been faithful in guiding us through this process and now is the time to partner with the Spirit of Jesus

to make these ideas, hopes, and dreams a reality.

To assist with this process, the Leadership Council spent time determining who will be responsible for facilitating each goal as well as generating suggestions for how the work could be realized, while leaving ample space for guidance by the Holy Spirit and for those who will take up the work to take it in new or deeper directions.

Over the past two years our consultant, Jeanne Zimmerly lantzi, modeled and taught us the importance of discernment. As the Leadership Council we do not want to leave this essential spiritual discipline behind.

We spent time individually as well as in smaller groups meditating on Psalm 23 and Philippians 2:1-11, to hear what God might be saying to us and



the wider Conference as we implement the Strategic Plan. As we listened, we sensed the deep assurance of God in Jesus' presence with us and that whatever fears, anxieties, or uncertainties we might individually or corporately be carrying about the future of the conference or the Strategic Plan, that our faithful God will stay close and guide us.

We were also reminded that sometimes the path to new life is through death. We do not need to be fearful or resist what might need to die for the sake of new life for our conference. The same God who raised lesus from the dead also has the power to bring life to our conference and congregations.

We are grateful for the time we were able to spend together and trust that it will assist us in our work together. We continue to covet your prayers for the Leadership Council and our shared conference life as we walk this path together.

Former Ohio Conference pastor dies at 82



Robert "Bob" Schloneger, age 82, formerly of Ohio Conference, passed away on March 25, 2024, in Goshen, Indiana. Born on April 17, 1941, in Louisville, Ohio, Bob married Enid Miller in 1963. They had three sons and one daughter.

Over the course of his life. Bob served in various ministerial roles, including many in Ohio Conference. He pastored at North Clinton Church (formerly of Ohio Conference) from 1977-1988; at Millersburg Mennonite Church from 1988-1994: and at Walnut Creek Mennonite Church (formerly of Ohio Conference) from 2008-2010.

In addition to congregational pastoring, Bob served as moderator of Ohio Conference from 1988-1992, regional pastor from 1995-1999, and as an Ohio Conference overseer.

Bob and Enid served two years with Mennonite Voluntary Service in Puerto Rico. He also volunteered with Meals on Wheels in his retirement and was a member of Berkey Avenue Mennonite Fellowship in Goshen, Indiana.

Peaceful Options for Training and Careers

A project of Mennonite Church USA (MC USA) and Mennonite Central Committee (MCC), Peaceful Options for Training and Careers (POTC) offers young adults from across the U.S. information about non-military career, service, and training opportunities.

POTC is an initiative that works to address the issue of military recruitment on high school campuses by showing young people that there are "peaceful and meaningful alternatives to enlistment," says Joe Roos, chair of the POTC Steering

Committee.

POTC has recently launched a new website that features a resource section of peaceful careers options, skills training, educational grants and scholarships, and service opportunities. There are also volunteer advisors available to help young adults find non-

military options that align with their goals. All advisors undergo training and a background check.

POTC also provides information on what to

expect in the military, helping those contemplating enlistment.

POTC is funded in part by MC USAs Peace Tax Fund.


